Volunteer Spotlight Devin Hannon



"I was looking for a way to keep me engaged. I wanted to give back, and my family has been connected to The Father McKenna Center for many years." Devin Hannon, a regular volunteer, reflected on his experience at the Center.

Devin is a 2105 graduate of Gonzaga Col-

lege High School and a 2019 graduate of Villanova University. He is applying to medical schools and is living at home, So he has some free time, and has chosen to offer 4-5 hours per day twice a week to the Center!

Devin's mother, Christine, has been a regular volunteer at the Center, assisting in the Food Pantry, for four years, so volunteering at the Center was a natural outlet for Devin. "My parents have taught me and my three siblings that it is important to give of yourself, and I came to the Center when I was at Gonzaga. I find that I am getting as much out of it as I give!"

Nayeli Garcia, the Center's Volunteer Coordinator, offered, "Devin is so easy to work with. He's willing to do anything we ask, and he does it really well!"

Engaging and Empowering Getting out the Vote!

April Cooke, the Jesuit Volunteer working at the Center this year, has spearheaded the Center's effort to get the men to exercise their right to vote.

"I learned that many of the men believed that they could not vote, because they were homeless. I was saddened by this misconception," she reflected

April led an effort to register the men to vote. She assisted about 35-40 men to complete the registration, and she checked that they are all duly registered to vote.

Some voted by absentee ballot, others waited to exercise their right on November 3, but on Thursday, October 29 April led a group of 20 men (pictured below) to one of DC's early voting locations that was convenient to The Father McKenna Center so they

could vote inperson.

"It's not just about voting we want the men to know that they are empowered and have to exercise the right to vote as a sign of their participating in the life of the community," April remarked.

Thanksgiving Turkey Basket Distribution: *A Sliver of 'Normal!'*



Each Thanksgiving The Father McKenna Center Food Pantry offers to the participants in the pantry a thanksgiving basket - a turkey and all the fixin's. For many years there have been about 240 families that have counted on us for a Thanksgiving meal.

We have been blessed to have several key partners to help us collect the needed food. Holy Trinity Parish has provided 150 + bags of food and the turkeys to accompany them. In 2020 the parish set a new goal of 200 bags and turkeys, and they "delivered!" St. Bernadette School in Silver Spring collected 70 bags and 69 turkeys for us. The students enjoy helping load the

food onto the Center's van each year! Connelly 35 bags and arranged a

School of the Holy Child in Potomac pitched in with 135 bags and arranged a donation of 50 turkeys.

On the Monday before Thanksgiving we distribute the turkeys beginning at 8:00 am. Thankfully, we have Board Members and other friends who come to the Center to help us give out the Thanksgiving Baskets.

The picture of the Meeting Room full of the bags and turkeys was from this year, and the adorable picture of a young boy proudly holding his turkey was captured last year!

The families are very appreciative, and we are very grateful to Holy Trinity, St. Bernadette and Holy Child for making this annual event happen, especially in the midst of the coronavirus pandemic.



Winter Coat Distribution

With the coming of cooler weather we are all pulling out warmer coats. If you are like me, that means going to the front hall closet and dusting off last winter's coat. Or it may mean a trip to a clothing outlet (online or in person) to purchase a new coat because last year's has worn thin or is out of fashion.

For people who struggle with homelessness, it means trying to find out which organizations are distributing winter coats, because they have no front hall closet or the resources to purchase a new coat.

Through many caring donors The Father McKenna Center is able to share

with the men we serve warm coats, hats, gloves, scarves, thermal underwear, and warm sweaters and sweatshirts.

Like all programs at the Center, we offer the men



the opportunity to select what they want from our stock of clothing. Each man is welcome to sign up for the coat distribution and each is called in turn to work with our volunteers and staff to choose a coat, hat, gloves and other items. The Center tries to delay the distribution day until the last warm days have passed, because the reality is that if it is too warm, the men will remove the warm clothing and because it is often too bulky to carry, they will leave it behind. And then need a 2nd coat, hat, and so forth

Throughout the colder weather we are always willing to accept a contribution of a gently worn coat that may be sit-

ting in your closet. You can stop by 900 North Capitol Street Monday to Friday between 8:00 and 9:30 am or again from 1:00 to 2:00 pm to drop off a coat!
